## Pastor's Pen

## Service To God

How is a Christian life lived? There are many scripture verses that give guidance, advice, examples and a lot of things-not-to do to live a Christian life. Paul's letter to the Church at Thessalonica can be a place to start to develop a deeper meaning to your life lived as a Christian. <sup>11</sup> *to aspire to live quietly, to mind your own affairs, and to work with your hands, as we directed you,* <sup>12</sup> *so that you may behave properly toward outsiders and be dependent on no one.* (1 Thessalonians 4: 11-12)

Living a "quiet life" does not mean being a loner or living in an isolation state. It doesn't mean becoming a recluse or monk. What it means is to live a day-to-day life that supports the kingdom of God and doing deeds that help your neighbors who have needs; it means living in an attitude of service and humility. It means giving words of encouragement reflecting the good news. It means conducting your life in opposition to wickedness met in the world. We are called to tell others about God's word, his promises made, his acts of blessings to all and his nature as reflected by Jesus Christ.

There are no grand announcements or parades that call others to see you – but a quiet life lived in service to God's will. To "mind your own affairs" is to tend to your personal needs and the needs of those in your care. And the message extends to your neighbor's needs who are poor in body and spirit. They are also your business. Minding your own business is not imposing your will upon others. It is acting with humility, remembering whose world this is and who claims the people of this world. Paul esteemed honest work. Remember, he was a tent maker (Acts 18:3), and he told the Thessalonians that working with your hands is a good value. It prevented idleness, it fortified a means to earn and provided financial support, and it allows people, like us, to have the means to give to the poor.

We work to support ourselves and our families. God, in His unfailing blessing of us, gives us the means to earn to meet those needs. God calls us to be productive and to give back to Him our first fruits of our labor. And it is this giving back that provides the way we can serve the poor. Paul says doing this will have a positive impact on our neighbor. Our testimony and our ways of living will help others see and experience the goodness we reflect that comes from our relationship with God. We do these things so that others may become disciples to Christ and believers in the way of God, so that they too may gain the promises made.

Let us be a generous people. Let us be generous in sharing the good news and God's grace with others today. Let's not misunderstand this scripture because we should be active, not passive; we should be outspoken, not silent; and we should be caring, not detached. And that means that, even today, we need to take seriously the call to encourage one another to be active in the Christian faith. It will change our church and community. It will strengthen our faithfulness.


None of these things could have been done without Mount Hermon's care and support of the student ministry.

**DISCIPLESHIP**



Orange Congregations in Missions (OCIM) is an organization that Mount Hermon has been involved with for many years. When we first started coming here, Rachel and Billy Clayton were the fearless leaders, encouraging the congregation to give, collecting the food and delivering it on behalf of the church. But because of health issues, they had to give it up so John and I have taken over this role gladly. OCIM has many hands. The main one we are involved in is the food pantry. Through social services, families are given a referral and will come to OCIM where we will "shop" a list based on the number of people in the family. We will provide them with food for a week along with laundry detergent and a personal pack that includes toilet paper, toothbrush and toothpaste, etc. Each month in the newsletter or bulletin, you will see a suggested food item to be donated. Donations are to be placed in the wooden box beside the glass case in the hallway. On Monday, John, John Mark and I will deliver them to OCIM, date check and then put them on the shelves.

Because of Covid, our donations have dropped tremendously and we would like to revitalize that. Beginning in November, we would like to encourage you to pick up one extra can or box item when you do your grocery shopping. This month, focus on items you would have at Thanksgiving dinner....cranberry sauce, stuffing, instant potatoes, gravy packets etc. The families are given the fixins for Thanksgiving dinner in addition to the regular groceries. Right now, the shelves are as empty as I've ever seen them so our donations are greatly needed. I'm encouraging you to fill up the box either weekly or monthly however you fill led and bless the families that are in great need.

God's blessing on each and every one of you and thank you on behalf of the families served by OCIM.
