
Children and Youth Ministry

OUTREACH: MISSIONS

We begin to look like an island remotely looking like the neighborhood around us. Thom Rainer, reminds us that to be healthy, we must look like our neighbors.

In his book, "Inside Out", Larry Crab, tells us: " If you want a more vital union with God, a richer relationship with others, and a deeper sense of personal wholeness, learn how to look inside yourself and discover how God works real, liberating change when you live from the inside out.".

Our vitality depends on us being liberated from self interest. Being a missional church means we focus on Christ call to GO, not sit and be our traditional selves. How about you, ready to GO?

Advent is coming up soon! During those first weeks of December, we anticipate the birth of our loving King, Jesus Christ. Advent is a time for us to place ourselves in an *imaginative space*; that is, we put ourselves in the place of the Israelites waiting for the birth of the Messiah. Here in 2023, we live in the wake of the resurrection (hallelujah!). We know how the story ends! But for these few weeks in Advent, we choose to dislocate ourselves from where we live here in North Carolina in the year 2023. We put on the mindset of an Israelite at the time leading up to Jesus' birth. The cry of the Israelites we make our own — *O come Emmanuel! Ransom captive Israel!* Christians since ancient times have practiced Advent in this way, as a spiritual exercise. When we put ourselves in the place of the Israelites — longing for the coming of the promised Emmanuel — we realize that we are not so different from them. Here, in the wake of Christ's resurrection, we also await the coming of the promised Emmanuel. We might even groan for Christ's return just as the Israelites groaned for the birth of the Messiah. In this way, Advent is also a time for us to anticipate the return of our King in glory. By looking back — placing ourselves in the longing of the Israelites — we are also looking forward to the coming of Christ, when he will make all things right.

During this month leading up to Advent, we will be creating a devotional booklet as we have in years past. This booklet will help guide us in this spiritual practice of Advent. I invite anyone to contribute to this with whatever gift God has given you — a short reflection, a poem, song lyrics, a story, or even quotes that have impacted you. The subject matter can be about Advent, Christmas, or anything related to our loving God and his wonderful creation. The Holy Spirit has given us all treasures, and this booklet is one place where we can come together and bring those treasures into a unity. So please, I invite you! From my vantage point at home, I have a beautiful view of the changing of leaves in this season. I love basking in the display of God's glory. I have heard that just the right amount of rain, sunlight and temperature will affect the vibrancy of the colors of the leaves. The nurturing of the soil and environment makes those leaves less or more beautiful.

I'm NOT here to say I understand the chemical changes that take place in order for those trees to be adorned in such beauty, (Dan Vogel could tell me the formula, I'm sure) but I'd like to make a (probably) weak analogy to the Christian walk.

Scripture tells us that all the earth displays God's glory. The angels called out in Is. 6:3, "Holy, holy, holy! The whole earth is full of His glory." and Romans 1:20 "For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—His eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that people are without excuse." God's glory is everywhere!

Once you confess you believe Jesus as the Son of God and ask Him to be the Lord of your life, the glory of God lives in you as well. The fruit of His Spirit is on display. I want to be a vibrant display of God's splendor and glory and I'm sure you do too. Our Heavenly Father is already doing a work in us, and He is faithful to complete it. With a contrite heart – we confess and repent (Ps. 51:10 & Romans 7:18-25) and as Titus teaches that we are saved only by God's mercy through Jesus' blood AND that He is continually renewing our spirit and our minds (pruning). He loves us so much that He continues to nurture us toward sanctification.
